As we enter the Easter season it's important to remember that Easter isn't meant to simply be a beautiful and colorful day. The Day of Resurrection is the "Eighth Day of Creation" in Christian tradition, because Jesus' triumph over the tomb is the beginning of a new creation: God's realm of shalom and wholeness, justice and dignity is being born within us and among us. During the Easter season we are to be particularly alert to signs of this new creation. Often these signs are subtle and quiet—like little shoots bursting forth from the hard ground of winter. One such shoot came in the form of a brief letter from a student in middle school. One of our members tutors troubled kids, and one asked if he could have a Bible. This is a student who's never been to church. So I found a paperback edition, tailored to young people, and we gave it to this student. He wrote me the following: "Thank you so much for the Bible. I enjoy reading it a lot, and it's the first Bible I've ever seen." His tutor reports that he comes each week with comments about what he's reading. A teenager reading the Bible for the first time is a small shoot of new life. Who knows what he will find in its pages—the Bible is actually quite a library and you can find just about everything somewhere in its pages!—but I pray this small beginning might help this student sense that he is the beloved of God no matter what circumstances he finds himself in. At the core this is the message of the Scriptures from beginning to end. And Easter is the profound expression of God's commitment that not even all the evil death can muster—hate, bigotry, and cruelty—will ever be able to stop the love that began flowing at the moment of creation and keeps flowing into our hearts this very day. It is this love that is slowly mending our world and ushering in the shalom and wholeness of God.

A second sign of Easter showed up at the pantry last week. I was distributing children's books to supplement the weekly food distribution. A mother with a preschooler walked up to our small bookcase—crafted by Joe LeRose for this purpose—and found a book about dinosaurs for her elementary age child. As she browsed her little 3 year old reached up and found a board book with bright, colorful pictures of a caterpillar. As I watched he turned the pages, his eyes sparkling with delight. To behold a small child--dealing with harsh realities--shine with the light found in the magical pages of books is to encounter the same sparkling light that burst forth in the moment of creation and burst forth from the mouth of a tomb. Such is the Spirit of Easter.

A third sign of Easter is the fact that my first two signs resulted from the care of adults who are willing to tutor struggling teens and fashion a remarkable pantry ministry. This willingness to put our hearts and lives into mending the world is how God transforms hard ground into rich, fertile soil. If you would like to become more of an advocate for such transformative work join us next Monday evening for an inter-faith introduction to faith-based community organizing. At this gathering we will learn skills, meet people, build relationships, and discern how to move forward together. Many of us are discovering that to improve life for all of us here in the Berkshires, we need to work together in faithful ways so shalom and wholeness deepens. This event will be held at First Church in Park Square from 6:30-8:30 p.m. Let me know if you would like to join us.

## ***Trustees Report on Facility Projects***

As a result of recent bequests willed to South Church, there are now funds available to address several facility projects



that were on the list for the pending Capital Fund Drive. The Trustees determined that we should tackle the most urgent of these projects now.

First priority is to rebuild the bulging brick wall at the southwest corner of the Parish Hall. We are currently working with the Bradley Architectural Firm who will provide the upfront engineering work and the bid package for obtaining quotes from the contractors.

Next on the list is to inspect all roofs to determine if any repairs are necessary. Possibly, the steeple roof wood shingles will need replacing.

Third, the parking area and driveway should be repaved. Shortly, we will be obtaining quotes to have the entire area resurfaced with a new coat of blacktop.

Fourth, we are in the process of determining what kitchen upgrades are necessary and the costs associated with such.

Fifth, the exterior wood portions of our building, including windows and doors, need to be painted and in some cases, repaired. It's probable that funding will not be available for this project until money is received from the pending Capital Fund Drive.

There are other important facility projects not listed above, but these will be identified and included in the Capital Fund Drive. As you can see there is a considerable amount of work facing the Trustees. It might be necessary to request help from church members who are not on the Board. So, don't be surprised if you get a call.

Our program speakers at this meeting were Jill Lipsky and her son Henry, representing Hearts of the Father Outreach – homes of refuge for orphans. This organization makes a difference for orphans around the world. The program was started by a husband and wife from Sheffield, Mass. who lost three children in a car accident. They started collecting toys on an impulse that they could not explain, except as a connection to their own children and to help forget, ever so briefly, their tremendous loss. Consequently they decided as parents without children they would ease the pain of children without parents.

The program expanded from donating toys to clothes, hospital beds, incubators, water bottles, uniforms, books, crutches, medical supplies, sports equipment and musical instruments. Jill Lipsky and her son play a big part in this undertaking. Henry is a forestry graduate and helped plant 100 shade trees, along with fruit trees in a hot climate. They have done many more wonderful projects than I could possibly cover. Just people helping

people! Following the presentation, May Mattoon voted to donate \$250 to this outreach program. Hostess was Pat Hill, who served a delicious spice cake with the help of many volunteers.

### ***WE’RE STILL HERE***

On the last Tuesday in February 1992 a group of seven retired South Church men met in Barrett Hall for a brown bag lunch to discuss an idea. Wondering if it made sense for a group of retirees to meet weekly, eat lunch together and then discuss timely subjects, we held our first gathering. We were somewhat tentative in the beginning, as often men seem to be reluctant to share their feelings with one another, however we met weekly until mid-June our first year and after reviewing the positive results decided to try another series starting the first Tuesday in October 1993.

Things were going so well we voted to call ourselves The Men’s Forum and meet weekly until mid-June again. At the same time we agreed that our group’s mission would be agendaless. Our purpose was not to be the church’s maintenance crew, or to raise funds for, or serve as workers on worthwhile projects. The goal would instead be concentrating our efforts on sharing our accumulated wisdom while discussing many of the events of the times. We took this unusual approach because most our early members were already separately volunteering as church maintenance men and project workers and might enjoy the extra opportunity to bond with one another.

The experiment worked. This month The Forum is starting its twenty-first year, meeting weekly year around now, with 16 South Church retirees and 14 retirees from the surrounding area as members.

As we always say, there is room for more, so if you are male, retired, and free on Tuesday, pack a lunch and join us in the Church Parlor—it will be worth your while.

## ***MINISTRY MATTERS***

Sunday mornings are a stressful time for pastors. Their ministries include interacting with dozens of pastors each week. It appears that there are some common experiences on Sunday morning for many of them.

Most people who love their church...and love their pastor...want to help any way they can to make the Sunday morning experience the best it can be. That's what this post is about.

Seven ways you can help your pastor on Sunday:

**Pray.** – Pray for your pastor. Ask God to open the ears of the people, to guide your pastor's heart and to bless the services with His Spirit.

**Don't critique.** – Sunday morning is not the best time to bring complaints. It is very distracting when the pastor is about to speak to hear criticism that will have to be dealt with later. It weighs very heavily on the mind and gets in the way of focusing on the message. Hold those until Monday, but even then, ask yourself if sharing it is personal to you or genuinely helpful to the entire body.

**Don't share something on Sunday morning that you want your pastor to remember.** – Most likely it will be forgotten by the time Sunday is done. Send an e-mail later or call Monday morning. If it must be shared on Sunday, please write it down so the details will be remembered. Their minds are so clouded on Sunday thinking about a million different things. And, they try hard to make their focus about a message we hope God will use.

**Be Kingdom-minded.** – Think of others' interests even ahead of your own. Keep in mind the temperature in the room may not be your ideal temperature, but it may be exactly the right temperature for someone else. Your song may not be sung today, but it could be the song that leads another to the throne of grace. The message may not address what you're dealing with right now, but for someone else, it might be life-changing. Be a part of the crowd that says, "I love what helps another" and you'll help your pastor and the church greatly on Sunday mornings.

**Volunteer.** – The work of the church can't function with only a few people. Have you ever known of a church that had too many people volunteering in preschool ministry, too many greeters, or too many people willing to do whatever it takes?

**Introduce them to visitors.** – Our ministers love to meet visitors, especially those seeking a church home. It is comforting when the church is bringing people with them or meeting new visitors as they arrive.

**Pray.** – It really does begin and end with prayer. More than anything, they want your prayer support. The Spirit of God seems to respond when you do.

Pastor, how else can people help you on Sunday?
