Our speaker at this meeting was Judge Joan McMenemy. This was an excellent program, wonderful speaker, interesting, enlightening and very informative. She is a judge in the Juvenile Court and spoke about how the system functions. The court tries to help young defendants put their lives back together and avoid wrong choices so as not to move into adulthood with a record. If adults are found to be contributing factors in juvenile cases, they can be prosecuted in the same juvenile court. Child abuse cases are tough to deal with and much effort is given to the future care of the abused. Case examples led to our conclusion that juveniles were being well cared for. It would take several pages to cover the complete presentation, and I admit to listening more than taking notes. The judge was interesting and held our rapt attention. We thank her for taking the time from her busy schedule to share her experiences and workings of the Juvenile Court. Judge McMenemy's journey to become a judge was not always smooth, but her determination to strive and pursue her dream paid off and we are fortunate to have such a person in our court system.

Hostesses were Karen Allender and Lois Moore, who served delicious cake and ice cream, after we all participated in the delectable choices from the potluck table.

From our Peirson Intern

As a person of faith and a religious professional, I cannot but speak about Monday's Hobby Lobby decision. I woke up this morning disturbed by the reality that certain classes of employers can now choose what portions of my mandated health care coverage I will not be able to receive because of my employers religious beliefs. I am disturbed that this ruling by five men affects women's bodies alone, and am disturbed by class issues implicit in this ruling. Those women who work for Hobby Lobby and other closely-held corporations quick to claim religious objections are mostly hourly and have limited employment options- they cannot afford private insurance, or get a "better" job that allows them the medical coverage they have earned. Those who are already our most vulnerable in the workforce are the ones affected negatively by this ruling, and we as people of faith have an especial duty to care for the poor and the marginalized. I have been horrified by some of the comments I have seen on social media about this case. God's heart isn't a democrat heart or a republican heart-God's heart breaks for the souls of God's people, not a corporation. There has been a slew of articles and comments published today claiming that contraception is anti-biblical, that all contraception is really abortion in disguise, that a women and her doctor should not have control over her own body anyway, and more. These are simply not true assertions; God calls us to care for the least of these, and to give voice to the voiceless. I am, as many of you are, privileged that my employer is not taking away any of my earned insurance benefits, privileged that I am not at the mercy of a place like Hobby Lobby. Our God-ordained responsibility then is to harness and use our place of privilege to work for the rights of those without the same rights, to speak where they cannot. The ramifications of the case are still developing. The UCC and other like minded collections of faithful people (including the Unitarian-universalists) have already put out statements decrying the outcome of this case; we all ought to keep a finger on this case as a place where we may be able to act for justice and the rights of those denied rights here. I have loved my first month at South and I look forward to two more. I have especially enjoyed working at the

community meal and spending time with many of you in discussions and visits. After a really good discussion with many of you post the 'signs of welcome' service, I have decided to hold a series of classes/discussions around gender, sexuality, and identity: "queer?", "understanding alphabet soup (gbtqi+)", "sex vs. gender vs. gender expression", and "expanding our welcome- where could we go from here?" I look forward to further learning and growing and laughing and weeping and celebrating with you all in the coming months.
