Here we are in the season of Lent, traditionally a penitential season that often involved making small sacrifices in imitation of Christ. Fortunately the season has gradually evolved into something more intentional. Here at South in addition to Sunday worship during which we will walk with Jesus towards Jerusalem there will be other ways to draw close to the steadfast love of God. I am offering a Lenten study of the Lord's Prayer from 11:30-12:30 on Sunday mornings following worship. Most of us learned this prayer in childhood and we sense something of its depth and power. But did you know that in its structure the Lord's Prayer is modeled on the creation story of Genesis 1 and like that story helps us remember the deep, holy, goodness of life. Like the creation story, The Lord's Prayer begins with God in heaven and gradually moves downward into the practicalities of life where God empowers us to live with daily bread, daily forgiveness, and daily guidance. Using this prayer is a way to be empowered for life. If you would like to learn more come join us on any of the Sundays in Lent.

Lent is also a season for deepening our vision of the wider world. One practical way to do this would be to volunteer at the food pantry or at St. Joseph's Kitchen. Help is always appreciated. Speak to Mary Wheat about ways to help at the Pantry or to Mary Rentz about assisting at St. Joe's. Also during this season a number of us have undertaken an artistic project to help raise awareness in our wider community about the life realities we see in our food ministry every week. On Good Friday a photographic exhibit will be unveiled that will tell the human story of local struggling families. Here is the rough draft of my press release for the event: "Each and every week hundreds of Berkshire families make use of the food pantries and hot meal sites located mostly in local houses of worship. Who are these neighbors of ours who on a daily basis struggle to eke out a living in this beautiful and scenic area? With 'Take Another Look', photographer Nick DeCandia, hopes to make visible the dignity, strength, and challenges of those trying to feed themselves and their families on minimum wage salaries or other minimal incomes. This evocative photo exhibit will premiere at the Lichtenstein Art Center on Good Friday, April 3. 'Take Another Look' will include a video of the project as it was developing. There will also be on display thought provoking statements from interviews with pantry and community meal clients along with those who volunteer in these efforts to assist our neighbors in need. On Sunday afternoon, April 12, there will be a viewing of the documentary, "A Place at the Table", at the Berkshire Museum, examining in depth the rise of food insecurity in our nation. A panel discussion following the film will invite creative responses to this ongoing struggle for basic human dignity. Through the photos, video, words, and film 'Take Another Look' seeks to develop a more informed citizenry which is the bedrock of cultural vitality in a democratic society and is a vital step in realizing hopeful change." Hold this project in your prayers for it feels very important.

In addition to these projects there will be a Lenten Workshop following worship on the 15th and with the Diaconate's help we will hold our South Church Seder on Maundy Thursday, April 2, at 5:45 before our Tenebrae Service at 7:30 p.m. What a remarkable season for drawing close to the steadfast love of God!

REV. JAMES N. McCUTCHEON

Brewster, Massachusetts

Reverend James N. McCutcheon passed away on January 21st at the age of 85. He is survived by his wife of 52 years, Janet, two sons, a daughter and six grandchildren.

After leaving South Church Jim served as senior pastor at the First Church of Christ in Worcester, MA, the First Congregational Church of Kalamazoo, MI, and Wayzata Community Church in Wayzata, MN. He earned a degree in engineering from Yale, a Bachelor of Divinity from Union Theological Seminary, and during the time he was with us he completed a Doctor of Divinity degree at Harvard.

A celebration of Reverend McCutcheon's life of caring and service to others was held at St. Christopher's Church in Chatham, MA on Saturday, January 31st.

REFLECTIONS FROM A SOUTH CHURCH PARISHIONER

Shortly after his arrival in 1951 our new pastor, Raymond Gibson noted that one of his goals for South Church was to introduce a new approach to community building designed to "deepen our faith and vitalize the expression of that faith in our corporate worship and our other activities." That was 64 years ago and while our membership has dwindled dramatically since 1951, we are still following that goal.

In 1957 when our associate pastor Herb Keebler left to become minister of the Congregational Church in Westbrook, Maine we hired Jim McCutcheon, a 28-year old bachelor, to help continue our vitalization program. South Church was moving into the most dynamic growth period in our church's history. Jim's assignment was to serve as Assistant Minister for Education for a rapidly-growing church school and a fledgling adult education program. He arrived to find a church school with over 350 children enrolled and some 230 attending class each week. When he moved on to Worcester in 1960 the church school had grown by another 50 students and was utilizing 50 teachers to cover the curriculum. I was one of those teachers, recruited and trained by Jim and so inspired by his leadership that I remained on staff teaching the high school class for ten years.

In addition to leading our very successful Christian Education program, Jim worked in the community during his tenure at South Church. He felt the Pittsfield High School curriculum was not sufficiently preparing the college bound students for the Student College Aptitude tests and set up a special after school training program for interested students. His classes became an instant success and by the time he left he was coaching young people from across the city to prepare for the test.

The Junior and Senior High School Pilgrim Fellowship programs were part of Jim's responsibility and this quote from the 1959 Senior High Fellowship president, Bob Livingston said it all: "I think an extra special thank you is due to Rev. McCutcheon. Jim is an extra special sort of fellow without whom the entire Fellowship program would be nothing. From teaching the classes for the college entrance exams, to worrying about the seniors being accepted at college, to playing the piano, to hiking and swimming with us, I think I speak for all the members of the Fellowships in saying, 'Rev. McCutcheon thanks a lot—you're a great guy.'"

Fifty-five years later I will echo Bob Livingston by saying, "Rev. McCutcheon thanks a lot—you were a great guy."
