This past week South held its 165th Annual Meeting. It was a time for sharing together the many dimensions of our church life. Here are excerpts from my Annual Report that reflect on some of our successes, challenges, and growing edges:

“This past year South Church was busy stretching for God’s future. Our Capital Campaign, “Stretching for God’s Future”, has now completed its second year. In 2015 our church kitchen was completely renovated and then dedicated. It is now a bright, welcoming, commercial kitchen... This past year our Parish House flat roofs were resurfaced, the Parish House trim was painted, and the front of the Sanctuary and all its trim were also painted... In 2016 the main roof of the Sanctuary will be re-shingled—and the idea of installing solar panels up there in the bright sun is being considered. What a marvel that would be!”

“We have been an active, caring, committed congregation stretching for God’s future in a host of ways. But you will see in the budget section of our Annual Report that we have a very large gap between income and expenses. It’s draining our resources. As active as we are we need to respond to these challenges in new ways. What does that mean? I’m not sure I know. But the place to begin is to clearly see who we already are and then seek out clues for how to move forward.”

“When I look at who we have been this past year here is what I see. It’s summed up in the phrase: Our journey inward is empowering our journey outward. South is on a journey inward to God as we open ourselves in heartfelt ways. We are also on a journey outward into service to others and our community, seeking justice and hope in this time.”

“Given the depth of the inward journey here at South it’s not surprising that the outward journey is dynamic and extensive... St. Joseph’s Kitchen at South is a key dimension of our journey outward... Our South Church Pantry continues to meet the deep needs of our community. This past week 485 families were served... Another expression of our outward journey is our Lord and Tailor Thrift Shop.”

“This year the Harvest Craft Fair is being revamped by a team of wise leaders in response to changing times. Our Church School is also changing. It’s growing and will need to expand the number of classes and its programming. In addition we will soon be receiving new members, having baptisms, and beginning a confirmation class... In the midst of financial challenges this is a congregation that is vibrant and growing in many ways. This is because we are on an inward journey into God and an outward journey into service, justice, and hope... I don’t think God is going to let us run out of money. But I do think God is asking us to deepen our commitment to growth and change. I don’t know where that will lead. We will discover that together as we continue to stretch into God’s future--a future opening up before us. What a journey! And remember we are not alone. Jesus is leading us. Let us rise and follow.”

SOUPER BOWL OF CARING

Sunday, February 7th

During the "Souper Bowl of Caring" children and youth across the nation work to fight hunger and poverty in their own communities.

This event takes place each year around the time of the annual Super Bowl Game.

They will be collecting small donations at the door following worship. 100% of the money collected will be used to help fill the shelves at our South Church Food Pantry. We will use the money we collect to make purchases at Price Rite for some much-needed items.

“TEN SHAKER SONGS”

On Saturday, February 13, at 2 pm, Hancock Shaker Village and Cantilena Chamber Choir will present a program of “Ten Shaker Songs” at South Church. Deborah Rentz-Moore, mezzo-soprano, will be guest soloist. The concert is part of Downtown Pittsfield’s annual 10x10 Upstreet Arts Festival. Admission is free, but a \$10 donation is suggested; all proceeds go to the South Church Food Pantry. A delicious reception will follow the program.

Hosted by Hancock Shaker Village curator Lesley Herzberg, the program will highlight 10 of the estimated 10,000 songs in the rich Shaker musical tradition. These songs will illustrate the themes, styles, and function of music in the Shakers’ worship and work. Ten singers from Cantilena Chamber Choir will perform Shakers songs in unison, as the Shakers sang, as well as in several arrangements by modern composers. Two of these arrangements were composed by Berkshire-based composers for Hancock Shaker Village’s 50th anniversary in 2010. Deborah Rentz-Moore will sing two hymns from a manuscript hymnal, *Hancock Hymnal 1850*, that she transcribed for Hancock Shaker Village.

The Cantilena Chamber Choir, now in its twelfth season, is the Berkshire region’s leading chamber choir. Directed by founder Andrea Goodman, the choir has received many accolades, including a multi-year Peers grant award from the Massachusetts Cultural Council for its innovative Martin Luther King Jr. program. The choir is a two-time recipient of the prestigious Choral Arts New England’s Alfred Nash Patterson award for innovative programming. The choir is in residence at Trinity Church in Lenox.

Deborah Rentz-Moore is an avid interpreter of Bach, Handel, Monteverdi and Purcell, and has been featured with acclaimed groups such as Aston Magna, Emmanuel Music, Magnificat, New York Collegium, El Mundo, The Boston Camerata and The Bach Sinfonia. A proponent of Shaker music, Ms. Rentz-Moore was featured in the remarkable “Borrowed Light” collaboration between dancer-choreographer Tero Saarinen and The Boston Camerata.

Ms. Rentz-Moore’s musical career was greatly influenced by growing up in South Church. At age seven, Debbie joined the children’s choir and was chosen to sing a solo verse in “The Palms” with Paul Nixon and the Senior Choir. That experience awakened in her a true love of singing. Debbie and her youth choir friends enjoyed singing together throughout high school for church services. She studied voice at the Berkshire Music School and continued her music studies at Skidmore College and the University of Michigan.

Lui Collins

Folk singer/songwriter Lui Collins has been performing, writing and recording for over 40 years, earning international acclaim for her music. Her music ranges from original and traditional folk songs and American standards to bossa nova in the original Brazilian Portuguese. She's made 16 CD's, performed on others' projects, and shared the stage with such folk-world notables as Tom Rush, Bonnie Raitt, and Stan Rogers.

Lui was voted third most popular performer at the Champlain Valley Festival in 1992, along with Pete Seeger and French Canadian band La Bottine Souriante. Renowned guitarist Dave van Ronk called her "one of the best guitarist-arrangers I have heard in years." Andrew Calhoun of **Waterbug Records** says, "Lui Collins sings the way people did a great long time ago, before most of us forgot how to breathe." And as guitarist/folksinger/songwriter Geoff Bartley says, "Lui's got the juju!"

In addition to her concerts, Collins founded Upside-Up Music and began teaching family music classes in 2003. Her current educational project is adapting her Kids' Jam curriculum for homeschoolers and other families beyond the hilltowns, as Upside-Up's Music at Home. Her latest creative project – which you will hear at her Bread and Roses concert - is learning old standards, as well as arranging favorites from her original repertoire, on her lovely little Pono tenor ukulele!
