How is a sabbatical similar to a capital fund drive? To answer that, I take you to the far north woods of Canada. A few years ago Tora and I, along with some good friends, paddled our way into the wilderness. One afternoon we crossed a large lake and headed for a portage trailhead. When we got to the spot where the portage was to begin, there was nothing there but a marsh. One canoe paddled deeply into the swampy area looking for landfall, while others got out and bushwhacked through tangled masses of underbrush. None of us could find the path that would lead to the next lake and our evening campsite. The idea emerged that beaver may have been at work and flooded the trail. We might be in for a night of unpleasant slogging. As we began to resign ourselves to this task, one intrepid soul suggested that, first, we head back out onto the lake and look over the whole scene again. It seemed pointless, but we hoped for the best. When we once again took in the big picture and compared it to our maps, we quickly discovered that a little spit of land a few hundred yards away might actually be our trailhead. And, indeed, it was. Sometimes, stepping back and becoming aware of the larger picture enables a way to open even when it seems obvious there is no way forward.

A sabbatical offers a pastor time to step aside from daily duties and once again take in the big picture. Each sabbatical I have experienced has opened new doors and enabled me to find new trails for my life and the life of ministry we share together. I am sure that without periodic sabbaticals I could easily have led the church into some very soggy swamps. Finding the way for the church in the 21<sup>st</sup> century is challenging enough without unnecessary excursions! A sabbatical time also offers the church an opportunity to experience fresh pastoral leadership. This is the gift of our Peirson Ministerial Internship. I am excited that South will be guided by Barbara Rice for these two months. She has just graduated from Union Theological in New York and will offer the church a wealth of insight, skill, and experience as she leads you and deepens her own pastoral identity.

But what does this have to do with capital fund drives? It's very wise and healthy for a congregation to step back from the weekly, monthly, and yearly progression of ministry and look once again, with fresh eyes, at the big picture. Who is God calling us to be? Where is the pathway forward? A capital fund drive evokes such questions, because it's not just about raising money, it's about finding our way into God's future. The estates of Granville Pruyne and Edna Dunbar have given us a wondrous push in this direction with their large gifts. This summer you will see new windows in Barrett Hall, Cooke Center, and much of the Parish House. You will see our parking lot paved and improved. And you will see a new walk-in cooler/freezer installed in our pantry. This is from their gifts. But we also need to tend to our steeple, paint the front of the church, and make kitchen improvements. To that end a fund drive feasibility study will be held in September to help shape our way forward. We may be an older church, but this congregation is filled with dynamic energy and a sense of mission even as new pathways are opening. New windows, improved parking, and adequate refrigeration for our pantry all point in a hopeful direction. I imagine Jesus at the head of our portage route saying, "Let your light shine" as he beckons us down this promising path. As you see signs of light shining this summer let those deeper questions come as we seek to discern our way into God's future. I'll be doing the same on my sabbatical sojourn and will rejoin you on this journey to God's promised future in September. Till then, blessings and peace!

## Capital Fund Drive Update

At the annual meeting in January 2012, our congregation heard a presentation on organizing a capital fund drive by the UCC consultant, Jennifer Davis. After her presentation, we voted to move forward and fund a feasibility study by UCC consultants. This study would help us determine what depth and breadth of commitment we at South Church would have for such an endeavor. Since that time, a committee of Will Garrison, Mary Rentz, Joel, and myself, with input from the Trustees and Church Council, have been putting together a package of needs, desires, and hopes that could be addressed by a capital drive.

South Church was blessed in 2012 with some large memorial gifts that the Trustees earmarked for capital expenditures. These projects are: parking lot repaving, new storm windows for portions of the parish house, and new refrigeration for our bulging food pantry. Other property projects in need of attention include the sanctuary steeple, our flat roofs over the parish house, and the updating of the Barrett Hall kitchen. These repairs and others will require more than what we have been blessed with through memorial donations.

To some, it may seem foolish to spend precious time, talent, and treasure on an aging building with an aging congregation. Preserving and maintaining our physical presence gives us a base in which to support our vibrant and committed congregation that shines a bright Christian light upon our community through our mission work.

The Capital Drive Campaign has contracted with Ms. Davis and Rev. Jay Terbush of the UCC to conduct the feasibility study. They will be working with us to formulate a financial goal and to assure the success of that goal. An important component of the study will take place the last weekend in September. The dates include Friday, the 27th through Sunday, the 29th. That weekend, the consultants will be interviewing many of our members to ascertain their vision and level of support for South Church.

In the coming months, you will be hearing and seeing more information about our Capital Drive as South Church lets the light shine through our faith mission.
