At the beginning of the Christmas Eve candlelight service, two weeks ago, I encountered a small problem. As we prepared to sing our opening carol I invited the smallest children to come and assist in placing figurines in the crèche. The problem was that ten children padded forward and I had a basket that contained only Mary, Joseph, the Christ Child, and an angel. As they gathered around expectantly, I responded by subtly removing shepherds and animals, one by one, with my left hand passing them to the children with my right. As a result everyone participated in gently placing the figures. But that was just the beginning. They looked to me for more figures to place. So, I kept removing figures as they kept placing figures--round and round we went till the carol ended. It was kind of silly. Yet the children were so gentle with the figurines and placed them so carefully—again and again. And their faces were filled with such wide-eyed wonder. They sensed they were touching the sacred. Who was I to stop them?

As this new year begins I have the thought that we are a bit like those children. The years go round and round as we read and re-read the sacred story of God's love over and over; and as we keep placing, removing, and re-placing the pieces of our existence as everything keeps changing around us but also keeps being the same. Do you ever have moments that you feel you're not really accomplishing very much as the years go by? I think we all do at times. But if we could have that sense of expectancy--of touching the sacred--that shone on the faces of those little ones Christmas Eve, then we might feel a bit differently about this journey of life. Children seem to be instinctively drawn to the sacred. As we grow older it takes more intentionality to keep that childlike spirit within us awake to the God who is at work in the midst of the flow of life. If we could approach this coming year with some of that wide-eyed wonder present on Christmas Eve, we might be surprised at how many glimpses of the holy we discover as life goes round.

On January 25 we come around again to our Annual Meeting as we gather to discern our way as people of faith, deciding on a budget, hearing reports, and electing lay leaders. Following our meeting the Berkshire Interfaith Founding Convention will take place at St. Mark's School (400 Columbus Avenue) from 1-3 p.m. After two years of planning and organizing, fourteen member faith groups--including Catholic and Protestant churches, synagogues, and regional religious judicatories--will kick off this founding event with food, music, prayer, election of officers, and sharing of strategies. This lively grassroots movement is a county-wide effort focusing for now on issues of food insecurity and mass transit needs in our county. Some of us have been involved with this organizing effort over the last two years. Having twenty South Church members attend this event—matching the numbers being sent by other congregations—to find out more about this effort to improve life in the Berkshires, would be great. Energized by our own Annual Meeting and the concerns we have for our wider community, we would then be joining with others who share the life of faith and hear the call to wider compassion. It could be a moment of wide-eyed wonder. There is a flyer in this Epistle about the event. Let me know if you would like to come.

St. Stephens Diocese sponsored a trip to North Carolina called "Winter Light." Sixteen youth from the Berkshires attended. It included skiing, Bible studies, and a dance to ring in the New Year! The group flew down December 26th and returned January 1st. Samantha Sperlonga and Pamela Pixley attended from South Church. Thank you May Mattoon for your generous support!

As we move on into January, we will be resuming our monthly mission event "Can Sunday." The 3rd Sunday of each month the students will be collecting a specific can of food to help stock the South Church food pantry. This month on January 19th we will be collecting cans of corn. When dinner was ready, Grandma walked out onto the porch, waved her apron, and the men knew it was time to come in from the fields to dinner.

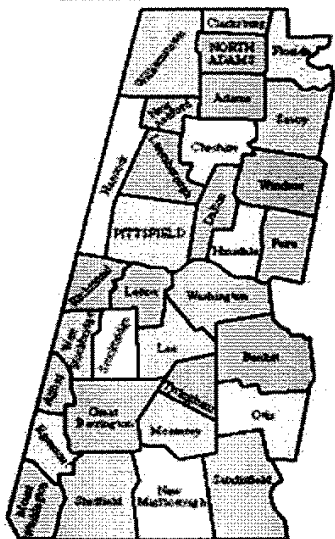
It will be a long time before someone invents something that will replace that "old-time apron" that served so many purposes.
