At our Annual Meeting last week these words from my Report stood out for me as I sought to discern God's way before us: "*Churches do not thrive by simply trying to maintain the past. Congregations need visions that transform the complex energies of today into hope that opens doors and leads into possibility. This is never easy. There are no guarantees. It's always a 'work in progress'.* *South engages this holy work by seeking to journey inward to God and outward to our neighbor.*" Later that day a dozen of us attended the founding convention of Berkshire Interfaith Organizing, an interfaith effort that has brought together fourteen or more faith communities to help make the Berkshires a better place for us all. Over two hundred faithful souls from Catholic, Protestant, and Jewish congregations from throughout the Berkshires gathered at St. Mark's School to celebrate this dynamic coming together of so many laity and clergy to love our neighbor in down to earth and practical ways. BIO as it's called is focusing its efforts on food insecurity and public transportation. Two research teams are currently collecting information, talking with officials, working with service providers, and hearing stories of courage and need. They are developing action plans that will seek to make practical improvements in these two areas. The core idea is that by working together to improve and change the systems that impact our lives we can care for our neighbor more effectively--in ways that empower and strengthen human dignity. I'm grateful that South is part of this holy work.

Our participation in BIO is a new expression of this congregation's 'journey outward'. The 'journey inward' will also be taking a new turn as Lent arrives later this month. I will begin a Lenten study following Sunday worship focusing on the Lord's Prayer. Each Sunday in Lent we will take up one phrase of that remarkable prayer Jesus taught his disciples and explore its rich, deep meaning. Many wise souls have commented that the whole of Christian spirituality is summed up in this prayer. Ash Wednesday is on Feb. 18 (there will be an ecumenical service at 7 p.m. at Zion Lutheran which I will help lead) so join me on Sunday, Feb. 22 for our first dive into the Lord's Prayer as we explore "Hallowing Thy Name—what does that mean?"

Another expression of the inward journey will take place on Sunday evening, Feb. 8, at 7 p.m. Tora and I, along with Linda Worster, will convene a gathering of our "Inward Journeys" experimental worship. Focusing on the theme of "Transfiguration" we will examine the story of Jesus' transformation on the mountain. But what about us? How are we transformed? How are our lives transfigured by God's love? Through words, silence, prayers, and the beautiful songs that Linda brings to us, we will explore what it means to be "in Christ" as the apostle Paul so mysteriously put it. What does it mean to step beyond the ordinary into the life of Christ that beckons to us? One way or another such a life takes us—and the community we call church—on a journey inward and a journey outward. It's quite an adventure! May it be so for you this coming season.

An Exciting Trip to North Carolina

I sure have, and the theme of Winterlight 95 was "Lost And Found." When I first got there I had this feeling within myself that this isn't the place for me and that I need to go home like right now, but that's expected right? I've never been that far away by myself like without my family and friends until a week ago, and it's scary honestly being a lot of miles away with a group of kids and adults you barely know or don't even know at all? Just the vibe of everyone there is truly great.

Before Kanuga, as I said, I was lost in my mind and unsure of myself and unsure about my love for God. It was like my love for God was fading because of how lost I was in my own mind, I mean I was very lost in my own mind. I miss everyone I met at Kanuga so much right now. We do a lot of three way and four way calls pretty much daily and nightly. I met someone at Kanuga who was also a camper like myself and we connected pretty well and he said a lot of great things to me at the healing service we had at Winterlight. Now this healing service was intense and it was the first time I've ever

experienced something like this, and I wouldn't mind being at another healing service. It was great and really refreshed me.

I did a lot of thinking about the main story we learned at Winterlight which was the story of the lost son. The son left his father and was selfish in a lot of ways and only cared about money but he came back to his dad eventually and was very sorry and felt terrible to the point he wanted to be a servant to his father but his father was happy to see him and had him put in the best clothes and ready to feast! It took me pretty much the whole trip to figure out the lesson-- well the main lesson of this story, but what I have come to realize in a way all of us have moments where we can be selfish, and all of us have gotten lost but not just in the way of direction with not knowing where you're going.

That under everyone's hard shell is someone who wants to be appreciated and loved.


I've learned...

To the Editor of *The South Church Epistle*:
A Simple Tribute

Thirty years ago this month, Priscilla Anthony became the editor of *The Epistle*. Priscilla might be able to tell you how many newsletters she has composed - season after season, year after year. With a Sunday deadline, Priscilla's "reporters" submitted their news on typed and scribbled pieces of paper – births, marriages, deaths, fairs, May Mattoon notes, children's plays, picnics, church suppers, ministers' messages.

In 1985, putting *The Epistle* together meant editing stories, re-typing them, pasting up the columns, and finding decorative images. Often the Editor would insert a humorous story or appropriate cartoon to fill out the yellow pages. Then the church secretary would take over, making stencil masters and cranking up the mimeo machine, hoping the inks would not smear. by Friday or Saturday, *The Epistle* would be in members' mailboxes.

Until the mid-1990s, this process happened every two weeks, as *The Epistle* was bi-weekly. Although the processes have changed, *The Epistle* remains the primary way our members get the news of our church community.

On January 24th at the 164th Annual Meeting of South Church, we celebrated Priscilla's milestone as Editor. Paula Haskell dug into the files to recreate the first page of 30 years of *Epistles*. These were made into 30 banners that were held aloft in Priscilla's honor, an impressive sight. Joel read a tribute to Priscilla by Laurie Norton Moffat, President of the Norman Rockwell Museum, which Priscilla has served for 35 years. The members and friends of South Church are presenting a donation to the Norman Rockwell Museum as a tribute to Priscilla Anthony. (Contributions made out to "Norman Rockwell Museum" may still be turned in at the church office.)

Dear Editor Priscilla, we take this opportunity to offer you heartfelt appreciation for your high standards, your gentle humor, your devotion to your job, and most especially for your unfailing graciousness and cheerfulness. Well done! Thank you! (And, oh yes, please remind us of the next Epistle deadline.)
