A few weeks ago a parishioner came to me and said a good friend of hers was terrified. The frightened woman was from El Salvador, an undocumented immigrant, who was fearful she and her sons would soon be sent back. She and her boys have been here a number of years. She had been an ESL student of our parishioner, learning English and finding her way. She had fled El Salvador when her young teenage sons had become the focus of a very violent international gang. The boys were told that it was time to join the gang or else their entire family would be murdered. To join the gang they would each need to kill someone. The protective mom scooped them up and fled the country, eventually arriving here in the Berkshires. They have been safe here. But because of our broken immigration system there is no simple path to seek asylum. If they come forward they will be deported. Our member asked, “What can we do?”

I wish I had a good answer, one that would keep vulnerable families safe and provide our country with its necessary level of security. What we need are wise leaders who can work with complex and tragic human realities to craft policies that provide pathways that lead to life for struggling families and to moral integrity for our diverse communities. Instead we have simplistic policies that demonize “illegals” and vastly expand search and seizure efforts throughout our country. Such policies will not keep any of us safe. How should we respond to these realities as those who follow Jesus who began his life as a refugee and died an outcast?

In our tradition there is a long history of providing sanctuary to the alien, outcast, and vulnerable. In Deuteronomy it says: “When you reap your harvest in your field and forget a sheaf in the field, you shall not go back to get it; it shall be left for the alien, the orphan, and the widow, so that the Lord your God may bless you in all your undertakings.” When we make room for those considered “outcast” we not only help them we also are blessed—Shalom is deepened. On Thursday, March 9, from 3 – 4:30 p.m. Berkshire Interfaith Organizing (BIO) is offering a workshop on how faith communities can support immigrants and learn about the modern “Sanctuary” movement. It will be held at the Lee Congregational Church. On Saturday, March 18, from 9 – 4 p.m. our wider UCC is holding a regional “Super Saturday” event in Wilbraham that will feature a keynote lecture and conversation on how in Christ we can work with people of all faiths for the common good. There will also be a host of workshops to enrich church life including how to support immigrants and the vulnerable. Contact the office if you would like to attend either event.

Finally, my Lenten study, exploring Henri Nouwen’s spiritual classic, “Reaching Out: The Three Movements of the Spiritual Life” includes a section on moving from ‘hostility to hospitality’. Nouwen writes that within each of us there’s an ongoing struggle between living a fearful, suspicious life and an open, hopeful life that welcomes others and our own deepest wisdom. Each day we find ourselves between these poles of hostility and hospitality. Can we center ourselves in God—daily--to discover the power to make wise choices? Join us for this exploration each Sunday following worship.

In this Lenten season with challenges all around us and also within us, may we follow the way of Love.

LENTEN STUDY
The Three Movements of the Spiritual Life

As a response to the times we are living through, Rev. Joel is beginning to plan a Lenten Study. We will be exploring Henri Nouwen's spiritual classic *"Reaching Out: The Three Movements of the Spiritual Life"*. The three movements are from Loneliness to Solitude, Hostility to Hospitality, and Illusion to Prayer.

We live in a lonely, hyper-individualized society that makes us prone to fear and suspicion. We live at a time when we are very aware of threats and our vulnerability which makes us susceptible to hostility to others. We live in a time when many voices tell us that God is an illusion in a world defined by money, power, and status. Nouwen provides insights and wisdom that can help us move towards solitude (a centered heart), hospitality toward others, and a prayerful life. I invite you to get a copy of this small book and read it this month and we'll begin the group following worship on Sunday, February 26th.

The group will meet during the six weeks of Lent. Come for all or as many as you are able. Child care will be provided.

What is Sanctuary?

"Sanctuary" is an ancient practice of providing safety to those who are victims of unjust laws. The modern sanctuary movement is about providing safety to undocumented immigrants and their families during a time of rising deportations.

Some of our clients at the pantry and friends of our parishioners are living in fear of being rounded up and sent to countries they left years ago because of terror or sheer desperation. Can we at South better support these immigrants and help protect the moral integrity of our communities? Berkshire Interfaith Organizing (BIO) is offering a workshop on Thursday, March 9, from 3 – 4:30 p.m. at the Lee Congregational Church to help local congregations do just that. We will learn what it means to be a Sanctuary Congregation and the steps that need to be taken. We will hear about the campaigns to pass "Trust Act Policies" in Great Barrington and Pittsfield, and the successful passing of such an Act in Lawrence, MA. The training will be provided by two Organizers from BIO's Group Merrimack Valley Project. All are welcome and encouraged to come.
