As March opens into April and winter releases its grip into days of subtle warmth and lengthening sunlight, this is a fresh opportunity to renew our commitment to open our hearts to the love of God streaming into our world. But in this world of ours with its many, harsh winds and deep hostilities, opening our hearts is not easy. Henry Nouwen—whose book “Reaching Out: The Three Movements of the Spiritual Life” we’ve been studying after church this Lent—says it this way: *“The movement from hostility to hospitality is hard and full of difficulties. Our society seems to be increasingly full of fearful, defensive, aggressive people anxiously clinging to their property and inclined to look at their surrounding world with suspicion, always expecting an enemy to suddenly appear, intrude and do harm.”* He wrote those words in 1975, but in our time of rising deportations, anti-Semitism, and racial hostility, Nouwen’s reflections are needed more than ever. He says this about the spiritual vocation of hospitality: *“Looking at hospitality as the creation of a free and friendly space where we can reach out to strangers and invite them to become our friends, it is clear that this can take place on many levels and in many relationships.”* For Nouwen, creating “free and friendly spaces” for those around us—in ever-enlarging circles—is at the heart of our vocation to follow Jesus.

Looked at this way moving towards hospitality begins with creating free and friendly spaces for those closest to us: listening to our children, being tender with our spouse, calling a friend, doing a small act of kindness, being patient with our own weaknesses. When we gather together on Sundays for worship we are invited into a free and friendly space for the sharing of our lives in the presence of the divine. When we serve at the Pantry, St. Joe’s Kitchen, Lord and Tailor Thrift Shop, or in other projects these can be moments of deep hospitality as we share our hearts as well as important tasks. When Mary Ellen Puntin and I took communion to Sam Sammet and John Anthony last week we were connecting with two faithful souls who can’t get to church at the moment—and enlarging the circle of hospitality. Whenever we are able to overcome our resistances—our hostilities—and open ourselves to the ‘stranger’ who stands before us—even if we’ve known them for decades—light shines and we move toward hospitality.

As we contemplate other ways of enlarging sanctuary and safety for those who are being targeted in this fearful, suspicious time, we are also aware of our own fears and the hostilities that get into us. As Nouwen tells us: *“It is realistic to realize that although we hope to move toward hospitality, life is too complex to expect a one-way direction.”* Such awareness prepares us for entering Holy Week which arrives this month. We seek to follow Jesus as faithful disciples. Yet Jesus’ own disciples failed him. Fear and anxiety caused them to flee when the hostilities of the people and the unjust laws of the land led to crucifixion. On Maundy Thursday we enter into the darkness that overcame the disciples so that we can respond differently. On Good Friday we will have an ecumenical service at 3 p.m. in the Parlor, including a dramatic reading of John 18:1 -19:42, with reflections from a number of local clergy. We will listen as the hostility of the world led to Jesus’ death. In this way we open our hearts to the pain of the world and to the love of God that overcomes even the power of deadly hostility. Join us as we move into God’s light and love this season.

FOOD PANTRY

A huge thank you to Darlene Berryman, Pam Garrett, Mary Rentz, Sue and Art Kaufman, Joyce Brown, the Networking Committee and the Mission Board for organizing a very successful St. Patrick's Day Sober Dance. The food was delicious and the band was great! Everyone had a wonderful time.

Our pantry at South Church continues to grow as more people become food insecure. In December of 2016, the pantry provided food for 5719 individuals. In December 2014, we served 3691 individuals and back in December 2012, 2750 individuals were served. This is an increase of 2830, more than double the number in just 4 years.

We try to have available nutritious foods such as produce, eggs, dairy and meats. Sometimes it is difficult to obtain enough food. For example, once a month our pantry receives 15 cases of eggs, each case has 15 dozen eggs which adds up to 225 dozen. In order to share them with more clients, we cut the cartons in half so that we'll have 450 1/2 dozen packages to distribute. The other 3 weeks of the month we do not have eggs to distribute.

This is where the money from the dance and donations is a huge help. Thank you for everything!

Remember, April is toilet paper month.



a non-profit coalition of Berkshire County residents, formed in 1992 to work to reclaim the Housatonic River system from years of neglect and decades of toxic PCB contamination. The more we have learned, the more we have realized what a large task we have set for ourselves, and the wider our scope of activities has become. While we began advocating for a river, our tasks multiplied to include fighting for a comprehensive cleanup of the General Electric (GE) facility in Pittsfield, Massachusetts, the closure of GE's PCB burn facility, the removal of PCBs from contaminated residential homes, businesses, schoolyards, and playgrounds, and demanding public health studies for former GE workers and members of the public whose homes were built on or near PCB-contaminated fill.
