As I sit to write these words the torrential rains are still falling in Houston and the surrounding region. In the midst of this catastrophe that has destroyed so much I am profoundly moved by the compassion of all those offering help in this tragedy. The barriers of race, class, political opinion and all that divides us falls away as everyone with any kind of boat or a pair of hands arrives to offer the help they can. It is inspiring to see human beings behave in such ways. I was also struck with awe at the recent total solar eclipse. Experiencing that event with family and a couple of thousand other people at a community park in western Kentucky was life-changing. I marveled at this celestial wonder and at the sense of communion that was created for a moment in that place as we all grew still and hushed in the presence of the black solar disk enveloped by the shimmering silver light of the mysterious corona. Earlier in August I deeply appreciated the two college women who suddenly appeared on the shoreline after Tora broke her wrist in the dark in our campsite along the lake. How was I going to get the canoe home? And then help appeared. These are all expressions of human beings at our best. What beautiful creatures we can be!

At the same time this summer I saw the scenes at Charlottesville and the hateful, murderous rage on the faces of those self-described white supremacists. They clearly have felt empowered to give public expression to this bigotry by recent political events. This past week a former sheriff of Arizona, who boasted of rounding up people with darker skin and putting them in what he called “concentration camps”, was pardoned of such wrong-doing by our President. Locally, members of the Jewish community have expressed anxiety about rising anti-Semitism. What contradictory creatures we humans are. Each of us was created for self-giving love and yet the darkness of fear and hate can eclipse such wondrous light.

Will we live in light or dark? Will we create community or divide ourselves into warring camps? In Houston as the rain keeps falling the predictions of a warming climate leading to warming seas, more intense storms, and melting ice caps keep being fulfilled. The growing catastrophe of climate change could unite the human family in finding creative responses. Or vested interests and rigid ideology can keep us in the dark. I am grateful to serve a church that seeks to live out the way of compassion in hands-on, practical ways. I am nourished by our worship together, the ministries we share, and the conversations we have about how to deepen our life in Christ. Something shimmering and beautiful shines here. We need such intimations of a deeper light in such a time as this. This month we will share in worship at the State Forest with our friends at Second Church, plan the CROP walk to support Church World Service with our friends at First Church, distribute tens of thousands of pounds of food at the Pantry, feed hundreds at St. Joe’s Kitchen, and join together for a church picnic on Cheshire Lake. And if you would like to make a donation to help with the recovery work in Houston designate the check to South Church, write “Hurricane Relief” in the memo, and we will send them to the UCC and work with Church World Service to offer our help. This is how the church in the 21st century can be the hands of Christ in a contradictory world. May we open our minds, lift up our hearts, join hands, and follow where Jesus leads. Peace.

On behalf of the South Church Deacons, we would like to invite your child to become acquainted with our newly-established Junior Deacon Program. The following will outline the goals and duties of the program. It is our hope that this program will supplement the spiritual life and energy of each and every participant (including our South Church Deacons.)

Program Goals:

Involve children in worship

Provide additional dimension to Christian education efforts in Sunday School.

Lay groundwork for Confirmation and a broader and deeper participation in church life as adults.

Possible Junior Deacon jobs: This list suggests a tiered approach, starting with what might seem to be “easiest” or least- public jobs and moving up to jobs with more of a leadership role in worship.

Level 1:

Ring bell (before church)

Collect communion cups (after church)

Level 2:

Hand out bulletins (before church)

Replenish pew cards/pencils

Level 3:

Light candles (during prelude)/Extinguish candles (end of service)

Take offering (during worship)

Help prep. for communion

Change paraments (before church)

Place hymnal numbers on hymn boards/
floor work

Level 4:

Serve as liturgist (during church)

Serve communion (during church)

Junior Deacons “badges” are available to wear for identification as Junior Deacons.

Maitre D's Needed for St. Joseph's Kitchen

Wednesdays, 3 - 6:30 pm: We are looking for additional people to manage guest relations for our Wednesday meal on a rotating basis. Art Kaufman and Dick Noble have been our faithful Maitre D's for the past two years. Dick is leaving because of family obligations. Ideally, we would have 3 or 4 Maitre D's.

Our Maitre D's provide a welcoming, comfortable, and safe atmosphere for guests from opening the doors at 3:30 until closing. They support the cooking teams by overseeing the coffee table and handling any questions guests may have. They welcome and provide assistance to the extraordinary volunteers who serve the 5 pm meal and clean up afterwards. They set up the silverware soaking trays and oversee or run the dishwasher after the meal. (Additional dishwashers are always wanted!) Our Maitre D' should be ready to handle issues that infrequently arise, such as guest illness or difficult behavior.

If Pastor Joel or Sister Kathryn is not present, the Maitre D' will make announcements - guest birthdays or other milestones - and offer a simple prayer of thanks at the start of the meal.

We usually have 75 - 90 guests each week, ranging in age from a baby with his parents and grandparents to very elderly. We serve a community of people who are diverse in their experiences, faith, interests, and abilities, but they are each sustained by the nourishment and welcome we offer each week.

We invite you to come explore the possibility of serving as a Maitre D' at South Church!

Other Help Wanted for St. Joseph's Kitchen

Servers are always welcome at the Wednesday night meal at South Church. Come around 4:30 pm, get a nametag, and our crew will show you what to do. You will be done serving by 5:30 pm, and clean-up is done by 6 pm.

Dishwashing help is always needed. We have a wonderful, fast, automatic dishwasher, but it requires a couple of people to move the dishes through. Our Maitre D's oversee the dishwashing. Even young people can help with the dishwashing. Dishwashing starts about 5:15, and is usually over by 6 pm.
